#### Citizen Summary

In the fall of 2004, the Planning Board of the Town of Holland entered into a contract with the Office of Geographic Information Systems in the Department of Landscape Architecture and Regional Planning at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst for the creation of a Master Plan.

#### Master Plan Requirements:

- 1) Goals and policies identified through interactive public process
- 2) Land use plan showing present and proposed land uses
- 3) Housing, identifying and analyzing existing and forecasted housing needs
- 4) Economic development identifying strategies and policies to expand or stabilize local economic base
- 5) Natural and cultural resources, providing an inventory and strategies for protection and management of those resources
- 6) Open space and recreation, providing an inventory and strategies for management
- 7) Public services and facilities with identification and analysis of existing and forecasted needs
- 8) Circulation, providing an inventory of existing and proposed circulation and transportation systems
- 9) Implementation program necessary to achieve objectives of the master plan. (M G.L. Ch. 41, § 81D)

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This Master Plan is the culmination of a planning process that began in 1995 with the completion of the Town of Holland Master Planning Study (University of Massachusetts) and the Holland Growth Management Plan (Pioneer Valley Planning Commission). In 2004 the University of Massachusetts completed a Community Development Plan and an Open Space & Recreation Plan. The Town of Holland has recently implemented zoning changes to reflect some of the recommendations presented in these plans.

Like previous work, the Holland master planning process included extensive community participation. Three community meetings were held to get resident suggestions and comments. Throughout the process, Holland citizens displayed a strong interest in the future of their community. The first public meeting attracted over 50 residents.

Holland residents enjoy living in a small rural community characterized by beautiful natural resources. But there is widespread concern that development pressure brought about by continued growth will begin to compromise this way of life. Through the community process, Holland residents prioritized their goals and objectives for the future

- Preserve Holland's rural character
- Preserve forested landscape
- Protect water quality
  - o Promote recreation on Hamilton Reservoir and Lake Siog
  - o Maintain safe drinking water
  - o Be proactive in solving water quality issues
- Promote economic development
- Improve communication between Town Hall and residents
- Maintain and improve quality of schools
- Increase opportunities for recreation
  - o Provide better access to Hamilton Reservoir
  - o Create more playing fields
- Develop and reinforce Town Center

These goals, which address a range of issues, share common themes. We prioritized these goals and presented them to residents as recommendations at the final community meeting held on November 13 and repeated on November 16, 2004.

# THREE MAJOR GOALS/RECOMMENDATIONS

**Protection of the water supply** – ensure that measures are taken to protect Hamilton Reservoir and the surrounding groundwater supplies

Economic Development – increase local employment opportunities and create a broader tax base for the town

Town government improvements – introduce measures that help town government work more effectively, improve communication with residents

These goals are discussed throughout the eight main sections of the Master Plan. Each section discusses ways to implement the recommendations within a realistic timeframe. We also include suggestions to "quick start" the implementation process.

The Town of Holland, the Planning Board, and town residents have demonstrated a strong commitment to the master planning process. This commitment must now be turned into action. This will require leadership and more hard work to maintain momentum. We present this Master Plan believing that the Town of Holland and its residents are ready to move forward.
